


Background and Scope

What does the IANA Function imply?


- Protocol Parameters Registries Maintenance
 - > 1000 individual registries
- Internet Numbers Registries Maintenance
 - Autonomous System Numbers and IPv4 and IPv6 addresses
- Top-level registry for .ARPA and .INT
- Root Zone Management
 - One of the Root Zone Partners (Verisign and NTIA being the other two)






Lessons learned








How can we accomplish our task?

(1) Work in communities.




(2) Coordination group coordinates and informs.




(3) Rely on community consensus.

RIR communities




ICANN communities


IETF community

Definition of Criteria

What are the properties of a good outcome

NTIA's requirements (principles)

- Support and enhance the multistakeholder model;
- Maintain the security, stability, and resiliency of the Internet DNS;
- Meet the needs and expectation of the global customers and partners of the IANA services; and,
- Maintain the openness of the Internet.



 NTIA will not accept a proposal that replaces the NTIA role with a government-led or an intergovernmental organization solution.

Recipes for Process Failure

- Lose major constituencies
- Perception of 'imposed by X'
- Lack of transparency
- Not delivering
 - Is a clear consensus to not deliver also a failure?
- Not being accepted by USG

 We collectively need to be able to unequivocally answer any questions about those criteria




Support and Enhance the multistakeholder model

- What does support multistakeholder really mean?
 - Open process, (rough?) consensus, bottom up organized, developed and prioritized, materially concerned parties, argument based, transparent and accountable process?
 - Applies on outcome or the process?

Maintain the security, stability and resiliency of the Internet DNS

- All these terms are relevant, what do they mean in the context of IANA?
 - Secure
 - Stable,
 - Resilient
 - Internet DNS
